



FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

As I'm writing this, war has begun in Ukraine. And our country as well as other democracies have been supportive of Ukraine and its president, Mr. Zelenskyy because he is "one of us", a president of a democracy based system of government. For as long as I can remember, even as a child, I have heard about the Cold War, the "bad Russians" and the fight against communism. There are endless movies about these political fights. There are even more books written on the subject of anti-Russian philosophies, which mean, really, anti-communist ideals. And yet in recent years, it seems that has softened and we liked Russians again. About fifteen years ago, I went to visit a woman who had a Russian home health care worker. She spoke very few words of English. She taught me to say goodbye in Russian, which is "Dasvidaniya" (Das-vidan-ia). For years, though, I thought it was the word for thank you (spacibo, pronounced spac-eebuh). We got our wires crossed about the word but she respected me and I, her. It was a good relationship and the only Russian relationship I have ever had.

As we pour out our hearts in prayers for the Ukrainians, let us please have a humble heart. We live on conquered land, stolen from Native Americans. Although I know we did not do the conquering, one lesson I hope we have all learned is that we are all capable of such abuse of power, all have potential to be greedy and take what does not belong to us. Evil and it's temptations are ours as much as anyone else's. So since we know this, we have a responsibility to protect ourselves and others from its grips. Praying for Ukraine is one thing but we may be asked to pay higher prices for fuel and we may lose money in the stock market. There may be even harsher realities we live with due to our hopes that we can help in the Ukraine, 5320 miles from Lincoln, IL. Ukraine, about the size of Texas, who is being invaded by a power bigger than the United States. We may not

like these sacrifices but just as in any state of war, there are costs that extend to people all over the world.

Loving Church family, we have declared 2022 a time for prayer. There are so many reasons to be talking to our God in these days. Let us continually pray for those most effected by war: The victims who are severely wounded, frightened children, those mourning the loss of their loved ones. Let us continually pray for love to win, instead of greed and the abuse of power. Let us continually pray for leaders both near and far to make decisions that will help end the destruction and horror caused by war. Let us continually pray we will be both humble and brave in the face of the costs to us in this war. Holy and Merciful God, hear our prayers! Amen.






President Kent Paulus called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, February 21, 2022.

Opening Prayer was given by Rev. Laurie Hill.

CONSENT AGENDA APPROVAL

President Paulus inquired if there were any items up for removal or discussion as it related to the Consent Agenda items. President Paulus asked that the financial reports be removed for later review. No other issues or concerns were raised. It was moved and seconded to approve the consent agenda without the financial reports. All voting aye, the motion passed.

It was moved and seconded to approve the January Church Council meeting minutes. All voting aye, the motion passed.

The Annual Congregational meeting minutes were reviewed.

It was moved and seconded approve the Reorganizational Meeting minutes of the Church Council. All voting aye, the motion passed.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Due to inclement weather the piano was not moved from Marcella Lenhardt's house to the church in February. Another date in March has been set for the move. Pastor Laurie will consult a business in Springfield about the cost of moving Marcella's piano to the church and removing the other two pianos which are in disrepair. If the move is within an agreed on amount, Pastor Laurie can proceed with those plans.

ST. JOHN 160TH ANNIVERSARY

By: Tonita Reifsteck 1921 – 2022 Recap #6 — History of Pipe Organ

The first pipe organ was purchased in 1893 – A pump organ that was 'pumped' by Richard Knorr for 25 cents per Sunday for the worship services music. The church membership was proud of the elegant tone and pitch of their organ.

In 1921 Mr. O.F. Mittendorf, president of the congregation at that time, appointed a building committee consisting of R. Henry Knorr, chairman; August J. Baker, Charles Lauer, Gustave Wilmert and Frank Klemm.

One of their assigned responsibilities was to purchase the pipe organ for the new church. In 1924 the committee went to St. Louis, Missouri, to attend a church service in a new church to observe its furnishings. They were impressed with their pipe organ and learned the organ had been purchased from the Walcker Organ Company of Ludwigsburg, Wurtemburg, Germany near Stuttgart. A similar 14 rand was purchased from this company. It was shipped directly from the factory in Germany to New York, then onto Lincoln.

R. Henry Knorr developed a great interest and love for the organ. He helped the company to install the organ; thus, he learned the working of the organ. Although professionally a printer he gave many hours and often closed his shop to fix the organ when trouble appeared. He also helped the 'pro-organ' maintenance man to repair and tune the organ.

Raymond Klemm, a proprietor of a grocery store, took care of the organ motor. At times, he found it difficult to find parts because the motor also came from Germany.

When installed in the new church built in 1925, the organ was placed on the floor outside of the choir rail, with the organist's back to the congregation.

The purpose was to give the organist a clear view of the choir director.

In 1962, Mr. Harry Kriisa of Decatur, who was tuning and repairing the organ, was authorized to build and install a new organ console for the sum of \$3,000. (The final cost was \$3200.)

When installing the new console, a decision was made to set the console at right angles to the old console – this would give the organist a view of the congregation as well as the choir director.

After years of usage trouble, such as ciphers, singing notes when no stops were on (!) or silence when stops were on (?) and motor problem became more bothersome, the congregation in 1971 voted to renovate the organ thoroughly, at a cost of \$17,000. with the initial payment to come from the Knorr legacy. Mr. Harry Kriisa with his wife, Vera assisting him, would do the work. Among those who helped assemble the organ was Elmer Hoefer, who at that time was a senior at Eden Theological Seminary. He often recalled Mr. Kriisa guiding him in putting ropes on the pipes so they could be pulled up to the loft.

The Kriisa rebuilt organ has a total of twenty-one



ranks,
fourteen of
them with
pipes from
the old organ
and seven
new ones.
The organ
contains

1259 pipes that measure from eight feet in height (some are combined to sound like sixteen feet) to the smallest being about one-half inch. A new motor was also installed.

As there was much empty space to heat in the organ chambers, and so much of the organ sound remained up in the chambers, walls were built

to enclose the working parts of the organ; thus, now all sound comes out into the sanctuary. The temperature in the organ loft is now approximately the same as in the sanctuary. For many years, Clifford Wilmert, with the help of Wilbur Wilmert hauled water up to the organ chambers to take care of the humidity needed to keep the organ parts from drying up and shrinking. Following Mr. Kriisa's retirement and death, Jon L. Bertschlinger of Quincy, Illinois serviced the organ.

On September 30, 1973 The Rev. Mr. Paul Bode of St. Paul United Church of Christ in St. Louis, Missouri dedicated the Kriisa rebuilt organ with a concert. The concert and a reception following the concert was open to the public.

On the 50th anniversary of the dedication of the house of worship of St. John United Church of Christ (dedicated July 12-15, 1925/St. John Evangelical Church) was celebrated with a complete remodeling of the church sanctuary. At this time of remodeling the organ console was moved into the chancel area to its present location. In 2001 a trumpet stop was added to the ranks in

honor of Wilbur Wilmert.

The following is a letter from Melissa Hamblin, the new Director of Volunteer Services or the Foster Grandparent Program with Community Action Partnership of Central Illinois (CAPCIL):

The Foster Grandparent Program (FGP) is an amazing opportunity for people 55 years and older to stay active and make a positive impact in the lives of children as well as the community they serve. The (FGP) is just one of the many services CAPCIL provides to help individuals in need. The primary focus area for the FGP is education. Our projects designed to engage our foster grandparent volunteers in service activities that will promote genuine improvements in the lives of children we work with, which in turn enriches the lives of the foster grandparent volunteers.

The reason I am writing is because we have several local-area Head Start and childcare sites that we would like to recruit more volunteers for.

The volunteer applicants must be 55 years or older and able to serve a minimum of 15 hours (no more than 40 hours) per week in a classroom setting. Must pass a background check and health physical examination. If applicants qualify, they can receive a tax-free stipend for services if income eligible. The program aims to keep seniors actively involved in the community and engaged in the program and the children they serve.

GALLONS OF POP TABS!




