

FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

We are soon approaching the most holy of all days in April but until then, we have to get through a lot of dirt. Yes, dirt. Dirt is what the farmers are now preparing before they can plant. Dirt is underneath our fingernails and under our feet. Dirt, soil, the ground, the earth is what God has created for us and God called it good. We are not so sure. Dirt, as my Mom used to say, "is an outside animal". So, we shoo it from inside to outside. We wash it down the drain with water. We sweep it hither and yon and sometimes under the rug to be out of sight. Dirt is for planting and standing on and that's about it, or is it?

Without this earth of dirt (and rock and other things), we would not exist. Without that nutrient rich soil we would not be who we are today. Without the elements within the dirt, we would starve to death. Without gravity pulling us down to the earth's surface, we would float into oblivion. We need the earth and are dependent on it for our subsistence. This helps us understand we are created spiritual beings filled with spiritual sweetness and the joy of Easter. Until that sweet day, let us be the best dirt-keepers we can be, caring for the earth, ourselves and each other.

Special Events – Jan Hahn reported that the Easter Breakfast will be back on Sunday, April 17th with a few minor changes. The committee will also be hosting a dinner following the church service on Sunday, May 22nd when Rev. Molly Carlson will be preaching and visiting our church.

Veterans Ministry – Jan Hahn reported that the Celebration will be on Sunday, November 13, 2022.

A Paint Party Fundraiser was recently held with 24 in attendance.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor Laurie reported that the Rev. Molly Carlson will be preaching on Sunday, May 22nd. Pastor Laurie will be gone on Sunday, April 3rd and Verdeen Ingram and Dean Meinershagen will be leading the service. Verdeen is Dean's mentor for Confirmation.

OLD BUSINESS

Security System – We are currently in the process of changing companies from TYCO/Johnson Controls to Tech Electronics. It was moved and seconded to approve the payment of \$9,988.17 in upgrades with funds coming from Contingency. All voting aye, the motion carried,

Up the Internet Speed – It was moved and seconded to increase the internet speed with an increase in the cost of \$100 per month. All voting aye, the motion carried.

Pianos – On March 5th Marcella Lenhardt's piano was moved from her house to the church by Moscardelli Moving and Storage, Inc. for a cost of \$300. Two pianos in the church were removed by Piano Network for a cost \$250. It was moved and seconded for the payment of \$550 to come from Interest. All voting aye, motion carried.

Task Force for ONA – The Task Force recently met with a UCC church very similar to our church to discuss the process they used to become Open and Affirming. With the knowledge they gained from them, our Tack Force then met to discuss how they would be start presenting and educating the

St. John UCC congregation on ONA. Their plan is start slow. They will make a more in-depth presentation next month.

Communion on Sunday, April 3rd - There will be no Communion on Sunday, April 3rd since Pastor Laurie will be gone and Verdeen and Dean are leading the worship service that Sunday.

ST. JOHN 160th ANNIVERSARY CHURCH'S SANCTUARY WINDOWS

Reap #7
Excerpts from The Rev. Elmer Hoefer

If a poll were to be taken amongst the members, both past and present and of visitors to the sanctuary of St. John United Church of Christ in Lincoln, Illinois on their 'take away' of the most memorable feature, more than likely most would say "the stained-glass windows in the sanctuary". None of the windows from the original churches had been saved so the windows were brought over from Munich Germany in 1925 to the new church being built on the corner of Seventh and Maple Streets. In communities close to Lincoln other churches and chapels, including Mt. Pulaski and Springfield had new windows by Franz Mayer of Munich, Germany installed in their churches which most likely influenced the committee for St. John choosing the furnishings for their new church. (Exact documentation of this isn't on file yet or 'buried')

Each panel is, in itself, a visual sermon for those who quietly meditate on its message. In the 1970's a special Bible Study was led by the Rev. Mr. Elmer Hoefer who highlighted each of the windows, its biblical background and the message he gathered from them. A booklet was made for the High School Sunday School class at that time by their teachers, that will be shared in full later. The Interpretative messages are: (from front to back on each side of sanctuary)

"THE GOOD SHEPHERD"

Psalm 23; Ezekiel 34:11-16; Isaiah 40:11and John 10:11-18



Portrayed here Christ is strong and stalwart but a look in his face – love and compassion as he gazes into the eyes of the little lamb he embraces. In His hand is a crook – to lift a fallen or struggling sheep over rough places – always leading with his flock following to a place of safety and rest for the night after a day's journey. A message to all – just as our day of Life comes to a close, if we are in the company of the Good Shepherd, we need never fear.

"CHRIST IN GETHSEMANE"

Matthew 26:36; Mark 14:32



Portrayed here is Christ alone in the Garden of Gethsemane after his last walk with his disciples. Gethsemane means "Valley of oil" or "oil press" so may have been a farm or olive orchard. Christ was aware of the ordeal that awaited Him and as was a common in His life he sought out strength and guidance through prayer with His Father, God. The look of stress/pain on his brow, his clenched hands and his position of almost laying across the rock indicate his agony — "Oh my Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me, yet not what I want but what you want". (New RSR)

"THE SOWER OF THE SEED"

Matthew 13:3-9



Christ used familiar life situation to help explain His message of good living and good life to those who listened. St. John families are of a 'farming heritage' so this window's message is easy to understand – but like grain not on the good soil but on rocky or weed infested land sometimes the message isn't heard that could enrich the lives of the hearer. "He/she who has ears to hear let him/her hear". He has given all humanity the example of a perfect life – we decide 'the soil' that it has fallen on.

"CHRIST AT HEART'S DOOR"

Matthew 7:7-12; John 3:19-21; Revelation 3:20-22



First awareness of Christ's message "I stand at the door and knock..." there is no latch on the door — He cannot open the door to anyone's heart. The door represents the human heart — a very narrow doorway. The soul of the occupant is the key to Christ's entry — the closed door is a symbol of man's willfulness — altho note the opening of grillwork in the door — (occupant can see who is at the door — awareness is there). Shutting Christ out of our lives, we miss life's greatest opportunity. Welcoming Him into our lives, we have life abundant. Each person has to open that door — no one else, not even Christ himself, can do it for us.

"JESUS BIDS PETER "COME"

Matthew 14:22-33; John 20:24-25



The invitation "COME" was spoken often by Christ and/or his disciples. "Come away for a time..."

"Come unto Me...." The invitation to make life better – a command to follow his faith even, as in Peter's invitation – able to walk on water if he could only believe. Even a slight faltering and we sink into the depths of despair, doubt, worry and other mental drawbacks. Walking in faith keeps us on top of the water alongside Christ who will walk with and support us in our weak moments. Peter, bold in word and actions often stumbled and fell but in His faith called out to Christ, his Saviour for strength, for help. That same saving grace is there for all who call out "Lord, save me!".

"ROCK OF AGES - The LORD IS MY ROCK"

Psalm 18; Psalm 31:2-3; Psalm 62:2; I Corinthians 10:4



This is a message concerning atonement – this reflects a "living and dying prayer". Salvation is within our reach. Oliver Wendell Holmes declared: "I recognize His wonderful power and solemnity... It is the Protestant Dies Irae". The rocky crag illustrated that is often reflected in art is often of the two massive piers of limestone rock near Somerset, England – known as the Burrington Gorge Rock. ROCK is used symbolically countless times in the Bible – not less than 26 times in the Old Testament and also as a place of refuge 20 times. Christ used the figure 'rock' in His Sermon on the Mount and His acknowledgement to Peter's confession of faith – "Upon this rock I will build my church..." (Matthew 16:18).

The messages molded into these six stained glass windows have inspired worshippers since their placement in 1925 and will continue to for as long as they stand. Reflect on them – share your inspirations with others – God's message of LOVE is there – we only need to "Pass It On".

Athletic shoes Egg cartons




Here in Central Illinois, we don't have wild hogs rooting through the fields, but we do have some excellent pork producers. These pork producers (including Paulus Farms from our own congregation) are also very generous. They are willing to donate hogs to the local food pantries. Phil Ruch from Immanuel Lutheran Church takes the hogs to the Atlanta Locker for processing. Phil then delivers the packaged pork to the CAPCIL and Lincoln Logan food pantries.

The folks at the locker give a discount to the Pork Project. But even with the discount, processing is expensive. That is where we can help. Our donations to the Pork Project ensure that the freezers at the food pantries will be filled with good tasting meat. And food pantry clients will be able to put that good tasting meat on their tables.

NEW PROTOCOL


SERVICES WILL CONTINUE TO BE "HYBRID": (a combination of online and in-person).
