

FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

Continuing the request of the ONA task force, in this article, I'd like to talk about the issue of marriage and the Bible. The history of marriage is so very multi-layered, it's the proverbial "can of worms". The institution of marriage and its many meanings have widely changed all throughout history. So many people of faith claim that marriage started with Adam and Eve, but if you read that story, there is no mention of marriage. They are helpmates to each other, which is a portrayal of a good relationship between life partners and in Old Testament times. There are clearly defined male roles and female roles that developed throughout Hebrew culture. We must remember that procreation was very most important in Old and New Testament times. People did not live as long as we do now, but children especially did not always live to adulthood. So, it became important for women to have multitudes of children. This lasted until relatively recently when the earth became overpopulated.

Since the Old Testament teaches that procreation is the main reason for marriage, if we want to be Biblical literalists, no one "should" get married except for that reason. Of course, those of us in modern times who are married and enjoy marriage, know that marriage in our day is far more about a relationship than bearing children. Marriage is a partnership between two people who agree to be faithful to each other as long as they both shall live. The only place Jesus speaks of marriage at all in the Gospels is when he addresses divorce. Jesus lived in the age when marriage was still for procreation and is harsh when it comes to those who divorce to marry another person. So do we now condemn those who are divorced and remarried? No, of course, not, even though Jesus is abundantly clear about it. Our understanding of marriage is very different than Jesus's day.

Marriage for us is a covenant, a promise, a vow between two people to be faithful to each other; to hold each other in trust, honor and esteem; to forgive each other, to love and bless each other; to create a family IF that's what they want to do and most especially, to be in relationship with God together. In our day, most couples are "in love", but in the past, marriage was a business contract, often arranged by the parents. Jesus and the disciples said that it's better to not marry so one can be more devoted to God and the Church, but he understood that some believed they should procreate. (Jesus wouldn't have said that he understood some people were in love since it wasn't part of his world view). We will never know about Jesus's life when it came to being "in love" with another person. He did call John his beloved disciple and gave the care of his mother to John upon his pending death. He did have loving relationships with women as well.

In Matthew 19: 10-12, right after divorce, Jesus discusses eunuchs. Eunuchs were usually men born with ambiguous genders or who later selfmutilated, so they were not able to procreate. Jesus explains some are born that way and some choose to be that way. He lifts them up as a blessed community because they can spend more time building the Kingdom of heaven. So, what is the truth for us today? Nowadays, we marry for love above other "business" sorts of arrangements. Since Jesus was all about love in every aspect of his life, Jesus would bless the love between any two people as long as they were in a covenant of faith with God and each other. I believe these two people can be any two, including those who are same sex people, who pledge their love with each other before God.

Once again, we learn through all Scriptures that loving relationships are good. The worst thing you can do to God is to worship an idol, which is unfaithfulness to God. The worst thing we can do to those we love is to be unfaithful to them. Rejection hurts. We all know that. There are complicated reasons why people are unfaithful in relationships, whether that cheating is sexual or a rejection of our spouse or significant other in

another way like hostility or contempt. (That's another article.) So, I hope you can glean from this article that it's my understanding of God that marriage is between two people who agree to a covenant of faithfulness until death do they part. The two people can be any two people. I know several gay couples who've been married for decades, just like heterosexual couples. I hope you will, like me, celebrate marriages as a love reflecting of God's love for us, in us and with us, just as I do. I have officiated at many same sex marriages and they are all still together, (which I cannot say for some of the heterosexual marriages). Love is love. The heart knows who we need in our lives as a life partner. I hope you will, like me, celebrate love in all its glorious ways!



SERVICES WILL CONTINUE TO BE "HYBRID": (a combination of online and in-person).



Aluminum Cans




Thanks to all of you who bring us your aluminum cans for recycling. Larry recently took two loads to Lincoln Iron
